A Brief History: Cyprus has had moderate success, finishing in the Top Ten ten times including reaching a new high, second place, in 2018. Cyprus holds the record for most entries without a victory, hitting 36 in 2019.

Israel was also the first country to win with televoting in 1998.

A Brief History: Walloon RTBF and Flemish VRT, take turns competing. RTBF is responsible for Belgium's sole victory: *J'Aime la Vie* in 1986. This is only the second time it is sending a Flemish act, making up for last year's cancellation.

Her music career began when she was 12 and started winning competitions and awards across the former Soviet states.

Additionally, an ESC legend, Chiara, hails from Malta; coming in 3rd in her first attempt, 2nd in her second, and bringing Malta to the Final in 2009 after two missed qualifications. Malta returned to the Top Ten in 2013 with pediatrician Gianluca Bezzina.
